



Pupil premium 2015 -2016

All schools receive a grant from the government for each child who is eligible for free school meals, who have been looked after for more than six months or who have parents in the armed forces. This grant is known as the pupil premium. The pupil premium allocated to Whybridge Infant School for 2015 -2016 was £48,840 a decrease of £10,060 on the previous year.

For the academic year 2015 -2016 the governing body decided to use the grant to provide additional individual or group support to pupils through additional learning support assistants and resources. The main focus of the support was to raise achievement in reading, writing and mathematics. Activities included precision reading, speech and language activities such as running the Talking Partners programme and Talking Maths programme

Impact of the pupil premium pupils.

Year 2 16 pupils

Reading

6 of the 16 pupils did not meet the expected standard. Of the 44 non- pupil premium pupils 7 did not meet the standard.

Writing

7 of the 16 pupils did not meet the expected standard. Of the 44 non pupil premium pupils 9 did not meet the standard.

Maths

5 of the 16 pupils did not meet the expected standard. Of the 44 non pupil premium pupils 9 did not meet the standard.

Science

1 of the 16 pupils did not meet the expected standard. Of the 44 non pupil premium pupils 9 did not meet the standard.

Year 1 10 pupils

Year 1 Phonic test:

90% of the pupil premium pupils passed the year 1 phonic test. Above national average.

Reading: At the end of year 1, 1 pupil was below expected standard.

Writing: At the end of year 1, 5 pupils were below expected standard.

Maths: At the end of year 1, 4 pupils were working below expected standard.

EYFS and pupil premium 6 pupils (one of which joined the school in May 2016)

2 pupils (33%) did not achieve a good level of development. 12 (22%) out of the 54 non pupil premium pupils did not achieve a good level of development.

The pupil premium for 2015 – 2016 is £38.860 a decrease on the previous year by £9980 and will be spent in a similar way by providing additional learning support assistant to run support programmes in literacy and mathematics to individuals and groups and to purchase resources.
